Unveiling of Two Public Artworks Created for the Senneterre Native Friendship and Support Centre

Senneterre, **June 25**, **2025** — Minwashin and the Senneterre Native Friendship and Support Centre (CEAAS) invite you to the unveiling of two permanent public artworks. These pieces were created by Anishnabe artist Summer-Harmony Twenish from the Kitigan Zibi community. Designed to complement one another, the artworks will be installed on the main building of the CEAAS and at the Shabogamak chalet, together illustrating two key aspects of the Indigenous identity of Senneterre: community life and connection to the forest.

A Public Art Project Rooted in the Land

MADAMIKANA, an Anicinabe word meaning "the crossroads", evokes these symbolic spaces where history, territory, art, and peoples meet. Led by the cultural organization Minwashin, this artistic mediation project celebrates the millennia-old presence of the Anicinabek through the creation and installation of six public artworks across the anicinabe aki — the Anicinabe territory.

Each piece, inspired by Anicinabe archival materials and Elders' stories, becomes a tangible trace of living memory, a mark of land acknowledgment, and an invitation to intercultural dialogue. MADAMIKANA is unfolding throughout summer 2025, creating a unique regional circuit of Anicinabe art. This is the fourth unveiling of the project.

The unveiling will take place on **Wednesday**, **July 9**, **2025**, **at 10:00 a.m.**, first at the Friendship Centre (910, 10th Avenue), then at the Shabogamak chalet (1770 St-Pierre Road), in Senneterre.

The event is open to all. A meal will be served on-site at the Shabogamak chalet.
